Site of Education for 90 Years

A presence along Stony Plain Rd and 156 Street for decades, the building known today as The Orange Hub has a rich local history. In 1935 the site housed a collection of buildings that served as the first school in the community (West Jasper Place)4. Grant MacEwan operated its Jasper Place Community College Campus at the site in 1973, hosting classes in the Central Elementary School until determination that a new building was necessary to accommodate students⁴. After inking a deal to acquire the land, construction of the 19,000 square foot facility began in 1978 by Edmonton-based PCL Construction¹, with its official opening ceremony held in April of 1981. 2025 marks 90 years where this parcel of land has been used for educational purposes.

Designed by Bittorf, Holland, Christianson Architects Ltd., the

Page 5: Valentines Destination: Arum Lily Flower Shop! building was lauded for its Late Modern design emphasizing open atriums and treating industrial elements as decor¹. The building was further emphasized as a place with a purpose, becoming almost exclusively dedicated to the arts as business students and administrative offices were relocated to other campuses. The facility was rebranded as the Centre for the Arts and Communications (CFAC), becoming a nexus for arts, music, and performance for the west end and Edmonton as a whole. Past establishments such as Ritz Diner Bar and Grill (previously located at 15135 Stony Plain Rd), offering regular performance opportunities for aspiring musicians³.

As MacEwan consolidated its downtown campus, the site was sold to the City of Edmonton in 2012 for \$36 million dollars, with a goal of transitioning the space into "... an intercultural, inter-agency community hub for arts, recreation,

A Cooperative Community Hub


Today, over two dozen tenant organizations occupy what was previously a private single tenant facility. The building is now a public space for community and artsfocused organizations, reinstilling artistic and creative energies in the space and broader community.

Colin Walbauer works for the City of Edmonton, as Tenant & Partner Liaison at the facility: "The Orange Hub opened its doors to tenants in 2018 and since then has grown to a very high occupancy rate of over 95% leasable space occupied," he says. "The community hub model is not something that is visioned by The City of Edmonton, but is realized in our tenant and partner organizations who take it upon themselves to meet their neighbors and find ways to build upon their programs and

Page 8: Check out our new Community Page! services collectively to meet the needs of those in the local community", noting that collaborations have become more organic within the collective over the years.

Jamie McRae is Interim Executive Director of FAVA, the Film And Video Arts Society of Alberta: "For us to be in a building with other like-minded individuals working in the non-profit sector, we find it to be a positive benefit to establish community relationships to learn more about each others' organizations and understand each others' unique needs and challenges that we face." He emphasizes that a city-run facility with staff leads to a greater sense of safety and security in the working environment, while the building's existing studio spaces suit their specific needs. "Being in a building of this scale has allowed us to grow in our [membership] footprint" he says, "further driving the sense of community in this building by having [more] working

artists in the building to interact with."

A Future Transit Hub

The success of the Hub is tied directly to an important node in Edmonton's future public transit network, currently being constructed on the west side of 156 Street. At Jasper Place Transit Centre, the existing bus network will integrate with a new stop of the same name for the Valley Line West LRT, connecting both services. Edmontonians from across the city will thus have convenient access to the facility, its multiple tenants, and the area as whole.

The original onsite parkade has been replaced by a three story structure which opened in late 2024, offering 181 stalls for transit users, tenants, and visitors and travelling shoppers alike. Designed by S2 Architecture in collaboration with gh3, the parkade features rounded edges and panels of close-knit chain link that echo design elements of the Hub itself. This material choice also allows one to see inside the parkade, akin to the multiple glass atriums throughout the Hub.

A Strong Foundation

The Orange Hub's transition to a nexus of non-profit services is a boon for the community, ensuring a a second life for the facility for years to come. Stop by and explore a bit of local history, and check out www.edmonton.ca/activities_parks_recreation/the-orange-hub for full OH offerings!

This holiday season we all carried a fair bit of extra anxiety. The looming threat of tariffs on Canadian products announced in November put a chill on consumer spending; yet more economic pressure on local businesses during a critical sales period. At the time of writing this, we've already been through the gamut, with a 30 day tariff "reprieve" as the administration studies foreign trade practices.

My recommendations? Encourage conversations that are inclusive and understanding, instead of judgemental and fearful. Meet people where they are, instead of demanding they meet you only on your terms. Listen with both ears, and respond with one mouth, knowing the conversation is never over but evolving as we each are.

Enjoy this issue of SPANN, which places an emphasis on celebrating and engaging our local community. Shop local. Shop Canadian. And remember - we're stronger when focused on our similarities, not our differences.

On February 11th at our upcoming Urban Planning Committee meeting, a report is coming back titled "Valley Line West 2025 Roadway Construction Options and Impacts". This report is looking to

answer the question "What specific changes would have to be made to get all the remaining road work along the Valley Line West LRT route completed by the end of the 2025 construction season?"

The answer may require some bigger short-term changes, such 24/7 work, or closing down certain segments of road instead of keeping a lane open in each direction while crews try to work in between. These details are expected to be included in the report.

For those living in the west end, and especially those living along the route, your feedback is needed. How much short-term pain are we willing to accept in order to get the road work finished this year?

can work in between the newly completed roads.

2025 is well underway with many things in flux. As I write this, Presidentelect Trump is about to be sworn in. Prime Minister Trudeau resigned, which means after a Liberal leadership campaign, we are likely to have a spring federal election. In the fall, the municipal election will be upon us. There are some changes provincially as well. In December 2024, there was a by-election in Lethbridge-West

We got in touch with organizing leader Brenda Ranson to learn more.

How did this initiative start?


"Our founder Wendy saw a program on Chase The Chill based in Winnipeg, and wanted to produce something similar here in Edmonton in 2014." Brenda, who manages the initiative now, advises that volunteers donate their own time and materials, including to other participants who do not have knitting materials to contribute. Participants range in age from 10 to 90 years old, all knitting and crocheting various articles of warm clothing.

What are some of the benefits you've seen in participating?

"It brings people of all walks of life together, from every economic background," says Brenda. It also encourages people to see things from different perspectives, such as visiting areas of Edmonton they normally would not. The group makes a point to hang their donations on the first Saturday of December, regardless of the weather, something that Brenda states is done to emphasize compassion and understanding for the lived situations of others in the moment versus when convenient.

"Each scarf helps a person."

Brenda recognizes the impact this initiative has on those in need, and how it fosters growth and connection in her community. "[Knitting] keeps us out of trouble. We knit every day; it's a great way to meet people," she says, while also maintaining one's independence. Her husband Stuart participates with the group, and gets plenty of attention for his knitting skills. She adds, laughing: "He does laundry, too!"




Canora Community Happenings

The team retired later in the 1930s. In 1938, Eleanore Tufford began playing for the Edmonton Blizzards, and moved to Calgary in 1939¹. In 1939, the Edmonton Bulletin reported that "Edmonton lost much of its girl hockey excitement when Corwin Tufford and the Rustlers' girls team retired from competition some years ago."6

Eventually, Eleanore founded the company Homes & Gardens Real Estate Limited, running the business from her family home in Jasper Place. Eleanore died in 2010. Brodrick, Eleanore's greatnephew, is now the owner.

In 1998, C. R. Tufford's legacy as a town councillor and coach of the Rustlers was honoured with the naming of Tufford Way in Terwillegar Towne after him.3

Edmonton is a city known for its championshipwinning NHL hockey team. However, long before the Edmonton Oilers came into being and began winning regional finals and Stanley Cups, a women's hockey team with roots in Jasper Place was making waves in the local and national hockey world.

The Jasper Place Rustlers was formed in 1929¹. It was coached by Corwin Ray Tufford, who moved to Edmonton from Toronto with his wife Mary. Later the family moved to a lot at 95th Avenue and 153rd Street in Jasper Place in 1914.

C. R. Tufford was elected as a councillor for the Town of Jasper Place when the town was incorporated in 1950. But he died the following year at the age of 61. "Prior to that, he was very involved with the Hamlet, then Village, of Jasper Place since moving his family there in 1914. He was the first president of the Jasper Place Tennis Club in 1922, and he played hockey on the community league's men's team. He was an active member of the community league until the late 1940s and was instrumental in establishing the first school in Jasper Place," wrote Michael Brodrick, Tufford's great-grandson, in an email to the Jasper Place Community History Project (JPCHP). Jasper Place's first school was West Jasper Place School, built in 1935².

Two Tufford daughters - Eleanore and Rosemary played with the Rustlers³. Eleanore played defense and Rosemary played centre. Both were considered among the top women's hockey players of the 1930s in Canada. Rosemary was part of the team's top line, which also included wingers Hazel Case and Marian Walker.1

Other players on the team lived in Jasper Place or in the west Edmonton neighbourhoods of Crestwood and Grovenor. 4 The name of the team appears to have changed to the Edmonton Rustlers at some point. Various articles referencing the

Complete Caregiving Homecare: Quality, Affordable Services

At fifteen, Tashana Preddie cared for her father as he experienced strokes and complications from diabetes and hypertension. At seventeen, she cared for her grandmother, who struggled with dementia and the loss of a limb due to diabetes. An immigrant to Canada, Tashana rushed home from Ontario to Jamaica to care for her mother during her final illness.

While working at a homecare company in Alberta, Tashana was inspired by clients who commented on the need for cost-effective services, so she founded Complete Caregiving Homecare. Her no-judgement approach to care is at the heart of accommodating people, meeting them where they are, and helping them find agency and engagement in the world around them. Kindness, care, and empathy are key elements in her approach.

Motivation is an important benefit of homecare, leading folks to take better care of themselves. "We do meal prep," says Tashana, "... as people are settling on unhealthy options - lots of bread and butter, peanut butter sandwiches." She emphasizes meal prep can help individuals regain their

agency by enjoying past food preferences rather than settling for the easiest. Going out for errands in public is equally important, whether it be for a coffee date or a visit to the grocery store to select veggies for that evening's meal.

A positive homecare experience will speak for itself. "My clients are attached to me," laughs Tashana, reminiscing about a company that called on behalf of a previous client months after her resignation, adamant she come back. "Kids (of clients) mention how much better their parents seem. Many (of these) kids are seniors, too." Homecare is often about accommodating evolving needs between several households.

Current Construction on Stony Plain Rd

The Valley Line West LRT project continues to make significant progress toward transforming public transit in West Edmonton. Marigold Infrastructure Partners (MIP), in collaboration with the City of Edmonton, is working diligently along Stony Plain Rd and surrounding areas to complete this 14-km light rail line from downtown to Lewis Farms. Below are the latest construction updates impacting the community; please visit our website for full and complete construction notice details.

Access Closures at 144 St and 155 St on Stony Plain Rd

Crews have begun drainage works on the north side of Stony Plain Rd, beginning at 144 St and 155 St

- Access to/from Stony Plain Rd at these locations is closed.
- Traffic has been shifted south and permanently reduced to a single lane in either direction.
- Turn movements are maintained where access permits.
- Pedestrian access will remain open with detours; please follow wayfinding signage.
- This work is expected to last one month.

Traffic Shift on Stony Plain Road between 143 St and 150 St

Preparing for upcoming construction, traffic has shifted to the south side of Stony Plain Rd.

- Most cross streets will be right-in / right-out only.
- On 149 St, two lanes of traffic in each direction will remain open.
- Access to businesses and facilities on the north side of Stony Plain Rd will be maintained, occasional access closures can be expected. Public will be notified in advance.
- Pedestrian access will be maintained on the south side of Stony Plain Rd, with crossings at 143 St, 146 St, 148 St and 149 St.
